



# Internet Safety Bingo

A fun game to help kids ages 6-10 learn important online safety rules!  
Play together as a family, in classrooms, or at community events to  
make cybersecurity education engaging and memorable.

# How to Play Internet Safety Bingo

01

## Get Your Cards

Each player receives a different bingo card with safety tips in each square. We've included four unique card designs so everyone has a fair chance to win!

02

## Listen for Call-Outs

The caller reads safety tips one at a time from the calling cards. Players mark the matching square on their card when they hear it.

03

## Mark Your Squares

Use coins, stickers, or colorful markers to cover squares as they're called. This makes it easy to track which tips you've heard!

04

## Win with Five in a Row

First player to get five squares in a row (horizontal, vertical, or diagonal) shouts "BINGO!" and wins the round.



# Safety Tips on Your Bingo Cards

## Basic Safety Rules

- Tell an adult if something feels wrong
- Keep passwords secret from friends
- Don't share personal information online
- Ask permission before downloading apps

## Good Online Habits

- Be kind to others online
- Log out when you're finished
- Use strong passwords with numbers and letters
- Don't click on strange or suspicious links

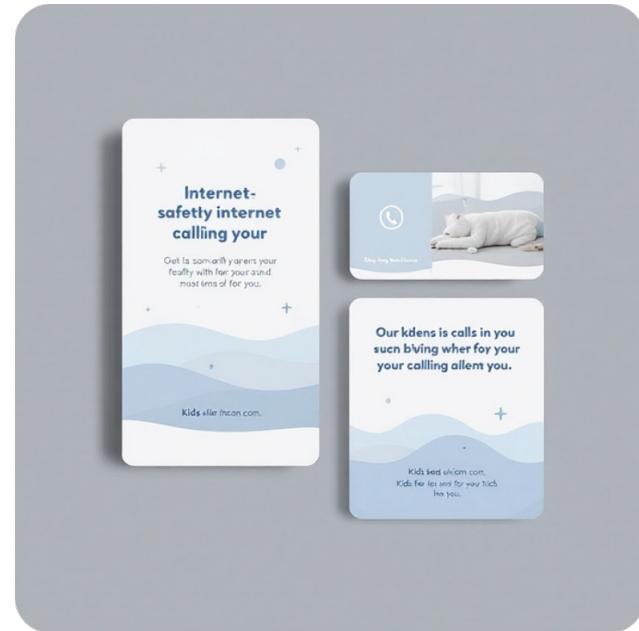
Each card features these essential tips in different arrangements, making every game unique and reinforcing important safety concepts through repetition and fun.

# Tips for Making Learning Fun

## Discuss Each Tip

After someone wins, talk about what each safety tip means. Ask kids to share examples from their own online experiences.

## Offer Small Prizes

Stickers, extra screen time, or a special snack make great rewards. Winners feel proud while learning important safety lessons!

## Play Multiple Rounds

The more you play, the more kids remember! Try different variations like four corners or full card blackout for extra fun.
